

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Evil for-profits...

- Deception in recruiting
- Student debt and default rates
- Quality of education

But lots of students attend, complete

• Move beyond minimizing harm

Major policies targeting for-profits

- 90/10 rule
- Publication of key program information
- Gainful employment regulations

For-profits also self-regulating...

- Toned down aggressive recruiting practices
- Orientations for at-risk students
- Free trails
- Raised admissions standards

From predators to allies: CLARITY IN RECRUITING

- Current policy: publish program information
- But students are not getting the information
- Reformed policy: further guidance on how to publish program information; comparative data

From predators to allies: UNSHACKLING STUDENTS FROM DEBT

- Current policy: gainful employment rule
- But this rule is currently on hold
- Is the problem the high loan balances?
 - Capping tuition
 - Providing more grant-based financial aid
- Or should we focus on the default rates themselves?
 - For-profit degree value?
 - Drop outs?

From predators to allies: QUALITY OF EDUCATION

- Current policy: accreditation? State authorization? 90/10 rule
- But these rely on a lot of assumptions to be effective
- Reformed policy: revisit the 90/10 rule

Final thoughts

- For-profits have much room for improvement
- Focus on four main tools:
 - More and better information
 - Use free markets to improve quality
 - Strengthen state authorization process
 - Increased accountability regarding student defaults
